#### UPGRADE TO AUDIO-VISUAL SUITE IN MAIN HALL

Shine requested some investment in the main hall to be used to purchase a new lighting and sound desk. This was approved and the money has now been well spent, creating a truly professional, mulitfunctional hall with all the refinement to be found in any theatre setting. We plan to detail what has been achieved and how this may be of use to all organisations within our Church.

In the original redevelopment of the hall, specialist cabling was installed so that the infrastructure was in place to be developed at a later date. This can be thought of as the nervous system. We already had some of the 'muscle' in the form of some lights and speakers. What we really needed was the brains to control the lighting and the sound equipment. As can be seen in the pictures we now have this equipment in place and have re-invented the upper room at the back of the hall as a control room, from where all lights and microphones, speakers etc, can be controlled.



Consider a performance from Shine or a travelling Amateur Dramatics group. They will be able to run the lights and sound from the upper room and send the sound from the stage to the Coulter Hall, as a backstage area. We can also send a video feed to the TV screen in the Coulter Hall.

At Shine's recent end of year performance we were able to control a projector located before the stage, from the Control Room. Even though every knob on the board does something, the system is relatively user friendly and equipment such as microphones are plugged in to the boxes on stage and then controlled for the projector room. The Hall could now be used for fashion shows, plays, AGM's etc. Both Gardiner McAuley and myself will be more than happy to discuss how this equipment can be used to suit your function and we will be happy to help with the event where possible. # WORD FROM THE MANSE

When it was built 2 centuries ago, it was called monstrous by the locals, who demanded that it be torn down as soon as possible. Yet from the moment its architect imagined the structure in his mind, he took pride in it and loyally defended it from those who wished to destroy it. He knew that it was destined for greatness. He didn't give up on it. Today it is one of the architectural wonders of the modern world and stands as the primary landmark of Paris, France. The architect was a man called Alexandre Gustave Eiffel - and every-one can recognise the famous landmark of the Eiffel Tower, built in 1889, on the Parisian landscape.

Gustave's loyalty to his creation reminds us of Christ's loyalty to another structure, no mere building, but the Church - called by God as the means of proclaiming the gospel throughout the world despite its sometime follies and failures.

Jesus Christ, the architect of the church, knows that the church is destined for greatness as it carries out his call.

I have had the opportunity to work in several different churches, both here, England and the US, and have also had the opportunity to visit Churches in other countries. In Eastern Europe the women sit separately from the men. In Russia the church buildings glitter and no one sits in a pew because there aren't any. Even in Ballyeaston our two church buildings are very dissimilar but none of these differences matter.

When our own congregation called its first minister, The Revd Anderson in 1763, there was no sanctuary, no pulpit, no choir, no organ or computer screens. Like many Presbyterians the congregation faced persecution and an uncertain future. And yet here we are 250 years later thanking God for their early worship and witness.

And that is how we recognise what the Church is – a gift of God. It is a gift, the gracious and generous gift of God's presence among us in Jesus Christ.

The non-essential things will always change. Our buildings will require repair and renewal but God's loyalty to the Church will never change. To our Presbyterian ancestors who had nothing, to our congregation which had nothing, God gave them all they needed – and continues to provide for us today.

For that reason we can take courage today as we look forward to the future. Things may well change significantly on our little island, politically and socially, but we believe the Holy Spirit will continue to guide and challenge us as we seek to be faithful to God in our worship and witness.

So do not be timid. Be generous with your time, your gifts and your money because God will bless our work just as God has blessed the generosity of our congregation for 250 years who gave so much more in troubled times. And together we will work not just with our brothers and sisters of the past but also our brothers and sisters to come.
